Fred and Ginger

JULY 13–15 In 1930, three years before Fred Astaire had even appeared on film, writer Robert Benchley had already proclaimed him "the greatest tap dancer in the world." Ginger Rogers, on the other hand, had never danced with a partner before she was paired with Astaire on *Flying Down to Rio*. The rest is history: over 16 years, Fred and Ginger would make ten movies together, immortalized as icons for their dazzlingly fleet-footed choreography and their singularly charming onscreen chemistry. It was an artistic partnership that would revolutionize and reimagine the Hollywood musical, reshaping the genre's legacy for generations to come.
